

Online	Using the internet or other computer network.
Offline	Not connected to any other devices or to the internet.
Identity	Who a person is, what they are like and their personal information.
Gaming	Playing video games.
Sharing	To put something onto the internet so others can see it.
Safe	Protecting someone or something from danger or harm.
Meet	Arrange to be together with someone.
Accept	Say yes to and believe to be true.
Reliable	Able to be trusted.
Tell	Give information to someone about something.
Smart	Being intelligent – also used to represent SMART e- safety rules.
