

Autumn 1


This half term we exploring music, songs and artwork related to different festivals and preparing for their first class assembly.

Phonics

We will continue with our Phonics sessions this half term and the children will:

- Choose the correct graphemes to spell a word - say the word, segment the word, write the word.
- Apply sounds to read look at the letters, make the sounds, blend the sounds together.

We will focus on the following sounds -



We will be learning to read the following tricky words: I, the, to, go, no, into

English

The children will explore a range of mark making experiences and will

Our reading and writing will focus on the blending for reading and the segmenting for writing of the following sounds.


The children will be writing dictated words and sentences for the following sounds:








Mathematics

Understand the 'one more than one less than' relationship between consecutive numbers.



To know that the last number we say is how many we have got (cardinal principle).

To know that we always say 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 in the same order (stable order principle).

Exploring mass and capacity

Subitising

Mantra – see the number say the number

Look at several dots, quickly cover up and then we say

the number that we saw.

Reveal to the child and use different arrangements of

the same number.

2d Shapes

Notice circles and triangles all around them and begin to describe their properties.

To use informal language such as 'pointy' or 'sharp' to describe what they notice

Learning about shapes with 4 sides (squares and rectangles)





Communication and language

This half term we will be focussing on speaking and listening.

Children will:

Learn social phrases e.g. – 'Please can I have a turn?'

Children will learn new vocabulary related to seasons and will use this new vocabulary to talk about what they can see.

Children will learn new vocabulary linked to festivals and will use this to describe how festivals are celebrated.

Children will listen to stories and will ask questions about what happened in the story and make predictions about what might happen next.

Physical development

This half term we will be taking part in Big Moves and basic skills. The children will:

- Develop their small motor skills so that they can use a range of tools competently, safely and confidently.
- Learn to hold a pencil effectively in preparation for fluent writing- using the tripod grip in almost all cases.
- Revise and refine the fundamental movement skills they have already acquired: rolling, crawling, walking, jumping, running, hopping, skipping, climbing
- Develop overall body-strength, balance, co-ordination and agility.
- develop control when using equipment such as balls, hoops and beanbags
- Children will learn simple dance routines as part of their Nativity performance.









Personal social and emotional development

Express their feelings and consider the feelings of others.

Identify and moderate their own feelings socially and emotionally.

Show resilience and perseverance in the face of challenge.

Begin to show an understanding of their own feelings and those of others and begin to regulate their behaviour accordingly.

Through our weekly PSED sessions, we will be learning:

 To identify who is special to me and what makes them special.

Understanding of the world

Children will continue to explore the natural world around them.

Children will become familiar with the wider school environment and will be able to find their way around school.

Compare and contrast characters from stories including figures from the past.

Know that pictures, stories, artefacts and accounts can tell you about the past.

Understand that life changes over time.

To be able to identify some similarities between pictures, stories, artefacts and accounts from past and present.

Children will continue to use the iPads to explore:

- Selecting colours
- Mark make purposefully on the screen.
- Experimenting with different tools.
- To use the undo button.

Expressive arts and design

Children will explore, use and refine a variety of artistic effects to express their ideas and feelings. They will create collaboratively, sharing ideas, resources and skills. Children will learn songs related to festivals and will perform some of these songs in assembly. Return to and build on their previous learning, refining ideas and developing their ability to represent them. Shape and smooth clay to create a thumb pot and use glitter and paint to apply finishing techniques. Return to and build on their previous learning, refining ideas and developing their ability to represent them. Children will learn to use a knife safely to chop and prepare vegetables to make a soup.

Children will learn about different festivals and how they

Children will be learning about the senses, seasonal changes in Autumn and Winter.

They will explore changes to materials and will learn about day and night including nocturnal animals.



Homework books will be sent home at the beginning of the half term. These will contain a number of activities relating to learning which has taken place in class recently. This will enable children to share what they have

learnt at school with adults at home and to show their learning in a variety of creative ways.

Please also take the time to read with your child each day. Research shows children who read regularly at home perform better in all areas of the curriculum.

We would like to invite all parents and carers to our Reading Open Sessions which will continue to take place this half term.

These will be 20 minutes sessions where you can come into your child's class and listen to them read.

We hope you will join us if you are able.

The sessions will take place on **Fridays** from 8:50 to 9:10.
