Technology is ever evolving and at OAK, we are fully aware that we need to equip our pupils with the necessary skills to thrive in the 21st century; over time, we want to put technology literally in the hands of every pupil.

We pride ourselves on preparing our pupils exceptionally well for the next phase in their educational journey and we are looking to harness the power of the iPad to enhance that position even further.

iPads will provide equity in the classroom from the very outset. Modelling, feedback, assessment for learning and indeed opportunities for creativity, will be more accessible, more efficient and in some cases, far more effective. Crucially, iPads also remove a variety of traditional accessibility barriers and makes learning easier for pupils with SEND or for those whom English is an additional language.

Opportunity is one of OAK's core values and by embracing 1:1 iPad, we are equipping all our staff and pupils with the digital learning tools of the next generation. Digital workflows are the norm in the modern world and OAK pupils will be fully prepared for that. As pupils transition through our schools, we intend to leverage the potential of mobile technology to support access to digital learning resources, anywhere, anytime.

Design, Technology, Food and Art

Rotary Club Design competition- 3 Teams of Manor students competed in the Leicestershire Rotary Design competition this half term. Students attended the competition held at Leicester Grammar school and competed against a range of schools across Leicestershire. All students were fantastic in their design teams, working together to solve design problems. All students received certificates for taking part, and 2 of the 3 teams came 3rd place. Fantastic achievement and opportunity for all students involved.

Maths

Four students attended The AMSP Maths Feast Competition at Castle Mead recently. It saw them taking part in logic puzzles, origami maths and numerical crosswords. All did very well and earned an award.



Humanities

We have had a number of enrichment lessons across our Geography curriculum, including 'Slum building' in Year 8, where students have been investigating what life is like for people living in settlements in Mumbai, India. Year 10 Students have been learning about the physical landscapes and have demonstrated their understanding about the 'High Force Waterfall' along the River Tees, through waterfall models.

Year II, have now completed their GCSE course by completing their fieldwork. They visited Oadby parade and the new housing estate on Stoughton Road, investigating the impact of new housing on the local area. Students completed questionnaires with members of the public. Mr Sloneczny was really impressed with how the students conducted themselves, demonstrating high levels of respect. We even received a phone call from a member of the public to comment on how impressed they were with our students

In History our students have been working hard. Our year 7 students are currently learning about the Tudor Period and in their upcoming lessons will be producing a creative task in which they have to construct an improved version of the Mary Rose Warship. It has also been a productive time for the rest of KS3 with our year 8 in the midst of their WWI studies and year 9 having just started their public health course. KS4 are now deep into their GCSE course with the year 10s just starting Elizabethan England and the year 11s gearing up for the big final push towards their GCSEs with a trip to the Richard III centre coming up on Friday 19th of April to give them that extra bit of knowledge needed for their site study exam.

Outside of the classroom we have had a number of competitions running thanks to the hard work of Miss Chudasama in particular.

In particular the winner of our Holocaust poetry competition have given us a stark reminder of the horrors of the past and the work still to be done to ensure a brighter future for us all.

The children have been out to Birmingham to visit the Think Tank, have a visit from the dentist and held whole school circle time for children's mental health week.

We have had visitors from schools in London and Cornwall who came to see us. The Senior Leadership Team lead a presentation titled ' What is it like to be a Brooksider?' where we shared all the personal development work we undertake here. They were very impressed with our school and I am sure have taken some ideas back to their own schools. We had some lunch, Indian street food, from a local delicatessen, which they all enjoyed. Well, you cannot come to Leicester and not try our fabulous food!

We took part in the Great British Bird watch and managed to see well over ten different species. Year 3 in particular showed some excellent wildlife knowledge.

For World Book day we dressed up as our favourite author/character/illustrator - which the children thoroughly enjoyed!

Sport at Woodland Grange Primary School

School trips and enrichment opportunities

Our Foundation stage children have recently visited Manor Organic Farm, which is a working farm, with Farmer Amy. They have looked out for signs of spring – from the frog spawn in the pond, the chicks in the hen house and the lambs in the field. They also looked for the less obvious signs – new grass that is growing and will be harvested for animal food later on in the year.

Year 3 children visited Bethel Church in Wigston as part of the RE curriculum. Thank you to the volunteers at Bethel Church for this visit. Our children in Year 5 visited Leicester University to think about the role geography and geology have in our world. It was excellent to be able to spend the morning in Leicester University and for our children to be able to see what opportunities there are after they have finished their secondary school education. Our thanks to the team for this fantastic opportunity, particularly Professor Holwell, one of our parents who made this possible. Year 6 children have, with the support of the Oadby Foundation Grant they give to Oadby schools, been able to attend The Warning Zone. This fantastic trip provides children with excellent life skills and prepares them for the greater independence they have when they move on to secondary schools.



Foundation Stage invited all mums or grandmas into school to enjoy a very special Mothers Day Afternoon Tea. The children had made the sandwiches, decorated biscuits and made decorations for the table to make this special event something all could cherish.

At Woodland Grange, the theme for World Book Day was 'come in comfort and cozy up with a book.' It was fantastic to see such a huge pleasure in reading across the whole school. In some year groups, parents joined the school in sharing stories with their children.

This term, Woodland Grange's Key Stage 2 children have participated in the National Poetry Competition run by Poetry By Heart. Again, we have been warmed by the brilliant support from home with the children learning their poems ready to perform.

In Years 3 and 4 the children have participated in the Freestyle competition: learning any poem, in any language, by heart and reciting in front of their peers. In Years 5 and 6 the competition is stepped up a notch with the children learning two poems from the PBH anthology; one poem written pre 1914 and one post 1914. Competitions were conducted in classes, with peers joining in the judging process. The judges were blown away by the children's recitals; how they effectively used voice, gesture, volume and performance to convey the meaning of their poems and evoke emotion. The judges had an exceptionally tough job of whittling down the finalists to the winners who have had their entries recorded and uploaded to the PBH competition. With fingers crossed, we await the announcements, whether we are regional finalists and will join the celebration at Shakespeare's Globe. Whilst we wait, in school we will celebrate our winners through sharing poems and prizes.



Preschool have been embracing all things spring. They were delighted when ten eggs hatched and they got to see the chicks grow. We were then delighted when parents joined us in school for an Easter Egg Hunt – a huge amount of fun was had by all!

Bikeability

Year 5 children were given the opportunity to improve their cycling skills this term, with lessons from the Bikeability team. Over the course of two weeks, children were offered lessons in cycling safety and road use. They were very excited to be in the fresh air, learning new skills and becoming more confident on the roads near school. Bikeability Certificates and badges were awarded for Level 1 and Level 2 proficiency, with personalised notes to ensure that children knew which skills to practice further at home. Road safety is a vital life skill for all of us, and it is reassuring for staff and parents to know that the children have received such high quality teaching. Well done to all those who took part, and thank you to Jon and his team. In addition to Bikeability, we had a visit from Sustrans, reminding us about road safety, and from The Bike Doctor, who repaired and safety-checked bikes for pupils and staff. Thank you to all involved.

Our Year 5 Brass group have had a great experience, continuing their brass learning with a specialist brass teacher from Leicestershire Music. They did a performance for parents at the end of their ten weeks of lessons. Many children across the school have signed up for brass lessons with the music service now and we are hoping we have the numbers needed to secure a peripatetic brass teacher to compliment our woodwind, piano, drums, guitar and ukulele peripatetic teaching!

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The school has been working on 'team building' as part of our ongoing whole school character curriculum work around resilience; as a school, we are passionate about teaching children the importance of resilience, communication and team work. Groups of children took part in some fun team building activities and games alongside Mrs Cross and a special visitor called Mr Amoroso. The children had a wonderful time and it was brilliant to see them working so well together.
